More Strife at Shire Hall Beach





First it was the Beleura Cliff path, now it's the steps down to Shire Hall beach.

There was already serious erosion at the beach but recent heavy rains have accentuated the problem, leading to this concerning and unstable pathway. There are probably multiple causes which need to be considered. One is the longstanding erosion and a lack of adequate mitigating measures.

The outfall from stormwater drains is another probable cause. These erosion problems, both Beleura Cliff Path and Shire Hall Beach, are currently detracting from the appeal of the area and need detailed assessments of the causes followed by detailed remediation plans with adequate funding allocation. - Ann Robb.

The campaign to Stop the High Rise Wall of Frankston news

We are off to VCAT!

Stop the Great Wall of Frankston

Why we have started this petition and why we need your urgent support

The Waterway Precinct between Nepean Highway and Kananook Creek

- Protection of Frankston's natural environment must be a priority, now and for future generations
- Frankston City is uniquely located along a waterway and an award-winning beach, the envy of other cities
- Proposed 41 metres (12 storey) building height at the waterfront is excessive and can even be exceeded, as shown by a recent 14 storey approval (with permit pending); and other applications for even greater heights are currently awaiting a decision
- Other bayside cities have mandatory low heights next to the coast to protect their natural assets e.g. 2 storeys for the foreshore in the Kingston municipality
- The cumulative effect of multiple high-rise buildings will be a wall that permanently separates the waterfront from the city centre
- Views of our prime natural assets, the bay and creek, will be monopolised by buildings at the frontline potentially impacting investment interest and the revitalisation of the rest of the city centre
- Excessively high buildings at the waterfront will dominate the skyline, permanently marring iconic views from Olivers Hill and from across Port Phillip Bay
- The community have consistently opposed high rise developments at the sensitive waterfront.
- Wind downdrafts will be uncomfortable for outdoor activities along the highway and creek promenade, which the Council continues to promote, the higher the building the more severe the impacts
- Long hours of overshadowing the creek each morning will affect aquatic ecologies and creek side vegetation along with afternoon overshadowing of both sides of Nepean Highway affecting established median strip trees and plans for increased vegetation
- High constructions and extensive site coverage with only token vegetation, will exacerbate, rather than mitigate urban heat effects
- Other precincts in the city centre can accommodate potential population growth
- Nearby residents' quiet enjoyment of their homes and gardens will be permanently changed; homes will be overlooked, subject to glare, artificial night lighting, increased noise, and increased traffic
- Traffic to and from apartment blocks by occupants and service providers (e.g. rubbish collection) will add to an already congested narrow one-way Kananook Creek Boulevard
- These developments will leave behind an irrevocable change to our unique beachside character

This will have far reaching implications right around the bay

Update from Trust for Nature

Ben Cullen, south-central area manager for Trust for Nature, reports that the White-bellied Sea Eagle has returned to the Tootgarook Wetland searching for Swamp Skinks and other reptiles. He has spotted it rising above other birds of prey – Swamp Harriers and Black-shouldered Kites – that cruise closer to the reeds.

It seems that every cloud has a silver lining

Across south-east Australia many plants and animal populations have declined dramatically during the millennium drought. However the La Nina flooding while it caused widespread destruction of infrastructure, livestock and crops, should encourage a systemwide increase animal populations according ecologist Professor Andrew Bennett. An influx of water increases the growth of plants and availability of nectar and this echoes up the food chain to insects, birds and other animal species.

Successful Restoration Project

This March, Boneo Park, which is privately owned, and Trust for Nature are celebrating the successful completion of the ten-year restoration project of the Tootgarook Wetlands and Moonah Woodland. The woodland is one of the finest stands of Moonah remaining on the Peninsula and the wetland, which is bordered by roads and housing, is crucial to filtering water flowing into Port Phillip Bay.
